The Missing Ingredient: State Inspections For In-Home Day Cares Reviewing The Ingredients

This audit focused on adherence to the eGuide requirements for In-Home Day Cares (82115). This class code references the Consolidated Underwriting Guideline for Day Care (Preschool / In-Home). This particular insured is an in-home day care provider that has been in business for five years. There is a partially completed Nautilus Day Care Application (A007) in the file. The insured is licensed in the state in which they operate. They are licensed for two infants from 2-24 months and four toddlers from 2-3 years old. There are no special needs children. There are three adults providing care. Days and hours of operation include Monday through Friday from 8am-4:30pm. The 2,200-square-foot, two-story, three-bedroom home was built in 2000. The application indicates the proper safety controls and compliance with building codes and health standards. The insured has a formal screening process and completes background checks on all employees. Medical records are maintained, and medical release forms are signed and filed. There are no pools or animals on the premises. The Nautilus Day Care Application is only partially completed and does not include information about annual state inspections. The account documents do not include copies of any state inspections. The Nautilus eGuide requires copies of the two most recent state inspections, and they must not have any open violations.

Taste Test

Due to the requirement for state inspections and finding none in the file, the auditor searched the <u>site referenced in the eGuide</u>* and found the last two state inspections for the insured. The most recent inspection included three unresolved violations. One addressed the discipline methods used that could cause harm to the health, safety, or welfare of an enrolled child. The second stated that personal products needed to be labeled with the child's name. The third violation addressed the need to separate the family's Rottweiler from the enrolled children.

Lessons In Gastronomy

State inspections provide a wealth of information on current conditions and are required for this class of business. In this case, the combination of having three unresolved violations, the violation of discipline methods, and the type of dog present make this an unacceptable risk to Nautilus. The eGuide states that "risks with more than two violations that aren't corrected immediately while the state inspector is on-site" are not acceptable and that "aggressive dogs on premises" are prohibited. (Examples of these breeds are listed in the eGuide.) Please refer to the Consolidated Underwriting Guidelines on Day Care (Preschool/In-Home).
